> No. What I am saying is if I simply make the correct play and fold, I
> haven't gained as much as if I can somehow induce my opponent into making a
> mistake before I fold. Every time you make a correct play and your opponent
> makes a mistake, you gain and he loses (in the long run) even if he wins the
> pot on the hand in question. The tough thing is trying to figure out how to
> exploit this small edge so you can benefit significantly in the long run. I
> think making minimum bets is a good way to bait your opponent into inducing
> you to fold (he is making a mistake by inducing you to make the correct
> play). Folding alone is the correct play, of course, BUT if you can not only
> fold, but also induce your opponent to make a mistake prior to you folding,
> you would naturally want to do so, since every time he makes a mistake you
> gain and he loses. I hope I am articulating my thoughts clearly enough.
